




OVERVIEW

This presentation will provide NSW SSOs with guidance on how to implement processes for handling dispute resolution, complaints and disciplinary action under the National Integrity Framework (**NIF**) and other policies developed by the National Sports Tribunal for misconduct outside the NIF (**Non-NIF Policies**).




NATIONAL INTEGRITY FRAMEWORK

A suite of policies that outlines the broad expectations for the [integrity-related] conduct of all participants in sport.


- 1. Certain conduct investigated by Sport Integrity Australia (certain by NSO) and sanctions determined by NSO or NST
- If adopted by NSO, SSO is automatically bound – SSO must also adopt to ensure its members are bound
- 3. What if the conduct is not acceptable but does not breach one of the NIF policies?

Sport needs to consider disciplinary and complaints handling policies to deal with other [non-NIF] conduct



NON-NIF POLICIES

- Must have a separate procedure for managing breaches of other non-NIF policies.
- Many (but not all) sports are adopting the (NST template) Conduct and Disciplinary Policy
- Some sports have adopted a bespoke conduct framework so C&D policy won't apply to all
- NSOs and SSOs should discuss and adopt national policies – define what constitutes (other non-NIF) prohibited conduct and adopt a national policy for managing breaches
- Going forward, will non-NIF policies be included in the NIF CDDP?



SSO TO ADOPT AND IMPLEMENT NATIONAL POLICIES

• SSO automatically bound if NSO adopts NIF / Non-NIF Policies

• SSO must also adopt to ensure its members are bound

• SSO adoption AND implementation

• Relevant risks

WHAT IS THE NATIONAL INTEGRITY FRAMEWORK?

Framework document (but no longer)

- Requirement to implement practices to manage the application and implementation of the NIF
- Integrity Manager and Complaints Manager
- A complaint can only be dealt with under the NIF if the alleged conduct took place after the Sport Organisation has adopted the NIF


• NIF Integrity Policies


- Member Protection Policy
- Child Safeguarding Policy (now Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy)
- Competition Manipulation and Sport Wagering Policy (now CM & Sport Gambling Policy)
- Improper Use of Drugs and Medicines Policy

• Complaints, Disputes & Discipline Policy

- Outlines the process for resolving complaints and administering disciplinary action arising from an individual or organisation engaging in prohibited conduct under the NIF

PROCESS FOR MANAGING COMPLAINTS UNDER NIF









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
NON-NIF MATTERS

- For conduct that is not prohibited under one of the four NIF Integrity Policies, it may be a breach of another policy
- Sports need a policy for dealing with potential breaches of other (non-NIF) policies
- Many sports are adopting the Conduct and Disciplinary Policy - conduct is investigated by the sport and sanctions determined by the sport or NST
- Some sports have adopted a bespoke conduct framework covering breaches of all policies
- If adopted by NSO, SSO is automatically bound SSO must also adopt to ensure its members are bound



PROCESS FOR DEALING WITH COMPLAINTS UNDER NON-NIF CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINARY POLICY








HOW DO WE DECIDE WHICH APPLIES - NIF OR NON-NIF?

- 1. Is it conduct that is **prohibited under a NIF policy**?
- 2. If yes, follow Complaints, Disputes and Discipline Policy
- 3. If no, is it conduct that is **prohibited by another policy**?
- 4. If yes, follow the process for dealing with breaches as set out in that policy
- 5. If no, has the sport adopted any other relevant policies?
- 5. Informal approach



CASE STUDIES

- 1. A complaint is received from the mother of Athlete B about the conduct of Athlete A's coach, Mrs Smith. Mrs Smith repeatedly emailed and called Athlete B, a 14 year old who competed against Athlete A, telling her she was a terrible athlete, that everybody hated her and that she should quit the sport. At the State Championships, Mrs Smith stood at the end of the competition arena making faces, holding up a fist and generally intimidating Athlete B.
- 2. The Media and Communication Manager at Sport Organisation informed the Complaints Manager that a member, John Jones, posted the following on SO's Facebook page:

Sam Rogers is a cheat and a liar and his only hope of winning at the National Championships is to pay the judge – that's how he won last year.

OTHER NON-NIF COMPLAINTS HANDLING PROCESSES

Personal Grievance Policy

Seeks to establish a formal process to resolve *interpersonal conflicts and disputes* that arise in sport, where not a breach of a conduct policy.

- NSO to consider if needed.
- If so, recommend amend it so that Sport Org has discretion to take steps to resolve conflict/dispute rather than obligation (and other changes)

Review and Appeals Policy

Provides a mechanism for non-disciplinary disputes - gives a relevant person/organisation a right to dispute decisions made by a Sport Organisation

- NSO to consider if needed
- May impose an obligation on Sport Organisation to refer Dispute to NST mediation or hearing, even where it does not consider this to be the preferable approach.



NEXT STEPS

- NSOs and SSOs to communicate: What policies have been adopted?
- Review existing policies and identify:
 - a) policies that will be replaced by the NIF and non-NIF policies
 - b) policies that will remain and how complaints and disputes are dealt with under those policies
 - c) any changes required to existing policies to incorporate the processes outlined in the Non-NIF Conduct & Disciplinary Policy (or equivalent)
- Update policy framework
 - revoke those policies no longer required
 - adopt new national policies and amend existing policies if required

Sport Science and Sports Medicine Policy	Yes	N/A - replaced by the Improper Use of Drugs and Medicine Policy	N/A - replaced by the Improper Use of Drugs and Medicine Policy. Board to revoke current Sport Science and Sports Medicine Policy.
Social Media Policy	No	Members to report breaches and suspected breaches to Sport Organisation In circumstances of a breach or suspected breach, Sport Organisation may impose a penalty, including taking disciplinary action available to it under the constitution or any by-law Sport Organisation may take action to remove any posted material that it considers to be in breach of the by-law	Sport Organisation should amend the Social Media By- Law to state that breaches are dealt with under the NST template <i>Conduct and Disciplinary Policy</i> .

CHANGES TO THE NIF - FEBRUARY, APRIL, JULY 2023

CDDP

- SIA jurisdiction child safeguarding and discrimination only
- All other alleged breaches determined by the sport
- Complaints or reports
- Sanctioning the sport, based on SIA case categorisation
- Delegation to other Relevant Organisations
- Possible inclusion of non-Integrity Policies
- Resolution process breach notice only, unless NSO refers directly to NST beforehand
- Respondents bound even if no longer a Relevant Person / Organisation (but practical risks)

CHANGES TO THE NIF - FEBRUARY, APRIL, JULY 2023

Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy

- Focus on emergency statutory actions if required (child welfare agencies)
- Harmonisation of child abuse definitions
- Sate/territory child safe standards responsibility of individual organisations
- Information sharing with SIA
