Question (de-identified for privacy)	Response
You are doing tremendous work for such immensely difficult situations, full commendations to you all. What training and support are you provided to assist in your work and mental health?	Peter Yeomans (post-recording): There is a robust process in place to manage Officer's mental health, which also includes regular psychological assessments.
What about where 12-13 year olds are abusing a peer including sexual abuse. Are those children able to be charged?	Peter Yeomans (post-recording): Yes, 12 to 13 yr olds can be charged (the age of criminal responsibility is over 10 yrs)
Should we be escorting kids under our care to toilets etc? up to what age?	Webinar participant I don't think there is an age limit to this. Sexual abuse can happen to anyone at any age unfortunately.
	OoS Sport Integrity Unit Some points to consider: • "2 deep" (ie including one other) supervision, escort but ensure child's privacy (balance between supervision and privacy). Escort to change rooms and back - but allow privacy • Age - guided by your policies and risk assessments.
"Pools" have been mentioned a lot. Is there a higher incident rate at pools vs playgrounds etc?	Peter Yeomans (post-recording): Pools are one of many areas where child abuse can occur. Mentioning pools was by way of example and not meant to suggest a level of higher incidence.
[edited] You've mentioned police keeping records of people that are charged with relevant offences, what sort of records are kept in circumstances where the complainant does not want to provide a statement at all.	Peter Yeomans (post-recording) Some parts of this question could be answered/ addressed in multiple ways (depending on circumstances). Main point mentioned/underscored in the discussion was the importance of keeping contemporaneous notes when an incident is first reported/recorded (ref 27:50 in the recording). Any notes which have evidentiary value will be retained by Police and may be used in any future proceedings (remembering that in many instances victims

do not always wish to proceed with charges immediately).
