

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

Likely to result in a substantial and demonstrably adverse impact on the child or young person's safety, welfare and wellbeing. It may be the result of a single incident or accumulation of these.





Changes to the Crimes Act 1900 in August 2019 strengthened the civic responsibilities of all adults in NSW. It is now a <u>criminal offence for adults not to</u> report to police if they 'know, believe or reasonably ought to know that a child abuse offence has been committed'

There are over 70,000 registered nurses in NSW.	<i>Response</i> (in subsequent consultation with our presenters) Remember that many employees in an organisation may have mandatory reporting obligations – BUT it is usually a people manager who acts as the registered mandatory reporter (eg a Head Nurse/ Nursing Manager in a hospital ward, or a Principal in a school)
	Additional audience question Prevention of child abuse is a complex task, so what role can sporting clubs play in prevention? Does it start with implementing the Child Safe Standards?	<i>Response</i> (in subsequent consultation with our presenters) Yes – employees and volunteers in child-related organisations have an important <u>part to play in creating</u> <u>child safe organisations</u> , via implementing the <u>Child</u> <u>Safe Standards</u> which emphasise the importance of adopting multiple strategies to address child safety.
