

Policy Title: Clearances to be accepted – persons exempt from registering with the Combat

Sports Authority of NSW (CSA)

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Summary: The policy outlines the requirements in relation to the CSA accepting clearances

for combatants from interstate and overseas.

Policy Statement: The policy details when clearances may be accepted and the considerations

made by the CSA in its determination of whether to accept a clearance.

Background: Combatants registered in other jurisdictions are required to demonstrate to the

Authority that they have met the requirements of NSW legalisation prior to

being cleared to contest in this State.

Applicability: Combatants residing interstate and overseas wishing to compete in NSW.

Requirements:

Procedure:

As part of determining if a clearance should be accepted, the staff member processing the clearance will undertake a check to ensure that the clearance should be accepted.

Check types:

Name	The person named in the clearance is the same as on the fight-

Regulatory	The clearance is from a recognised equivalent Australian
Body	Regulatory Body being the WA Combat Sports Commission, the
	Professional Boxing and Combat Sports Board of Victoria or
	South Australian Boxing and Martial Arts Authority.

	An overseas body regulatory body, a national or international
	sporting organisation that is pertinent to the type of contest proposed.
Currency	The clearance is current and covers the date on which the contest is proposed.
Overseas	A certificate of fitness given by a medical practitioner in the
combatants	approved form and current serology clearance that was obtained
	within Australia in the 6 months (12 months under 18 years) prior
	to the contest has been provided to the Authority. These
	certificates are in the name of the combatant named on the fight
	card and in the clearance.
